

Strategic Policy Committee Scheme 2024-2029

Scéim an Choiste um Beartais Straitéiseacha 2024 – 2029

The statutory basis for SPCs is set out in section 48 of the Local Government Act 2001 as amended by section 48(1a) of the Local Government Reform Act 2014.

Circular LG09/2024 dated 7th June 2024, outlines the requirement for each Local Authority following the local elections to establish new Strategic Policy Committees (SPCs) in line with revised guidelines published by the Department in June 2024 for Establishment and Operation of Corporate Policy Groups (CPGs) and Strategic Policy Committees (SPCs). The guidelines seek to ensure there is a clear understanding of the work of SPCs and includes guidance on incorporating climate action into SPC work groups.

The Council has decided to include minor modifications to the SPC structure by the introduction of an additional SPC – Coastal, Marine and Flood Policy

ROLE OF THE COUNCIL

Cork County Council delivers a wide range of services and provides infrastructure to all of the citizens of the County. The day-to-day delivery of services is the responsibility of the Chief Executive, Management Team, and Staff, while 55 Elected Members perform the Council's Democratic / Representational Role.

ROLE OF THE STRATEGIC POLICY COMMITTEES (SPC)

The Council is and will continue to be the decision-making authority. It is the SPCs' task to assist the Council in the formulation, development, and review of policy. It is intended that the SPC system will give Councillors and sectoral interests an opportunity to be fully involved in the policy making process from an early stage when policy options are more fluid. SPCs prepare the groundwork for policies which are then decided on by the Council, including as appropriate at municipal district level. Each SPC is required to have regard to the Regional Spatial and Economic Strategy prepared by the Regional Assembly.

ROLE OF CORPORATE POLICY GROUP (CPG)

The role of the CPG is strategic, and it links and co-ordinates the work of the different SPCs. The Corporate Policy Group also recommends issues to be considered by the SPCs. The SPC Administrator on behalf of the Chair will send a report to Full Council on work of SPC on a quarterly basis. Chairs of SPCs should report back from Full Council to their committees and reps of each MD to their respective MD areas. In addition, CPG

- Full Council may directly refer matters to SPC for discussion/consideration.
- Play a key role in preparing the budget.
- Provide input to Full Council on any matter of general concern to the Council either on its own initiative or following a request from the Council.
- Monitor overall performance of a Local Authority including in relation to matters of governance and oversight, in particular in relation to consideration of reports of Audit Committee, Local Government Auditor and National Oversight Audit Commission.

- Request SPCs to consider particular policy issues where appropriate.
- Be consulted in preparation of the Corporate Plan.
- Approve the work programmes of the SPCs and monitor their achievement.
- The approved minutes of the CPG meetings will be circulated to all Elected Members.
- Ensure that SPC members receive timely updates from the CPG.

PROPOSED STRUCTURE

- The Scheme provides for the establishment of nine Strategic Policy Committees having a county wide remit.
- Committees will have a maximum of 24 members, a minimum of one third of whom will be drawn from relevant sectoral interests.
- Each Member of Cork County Council will be a member of two SPCs.
- Each SPC will meet at least once every three months and will regulate its own business and proceedings subject to the Council's Standing Orders.
- The appointment of SPC Chairs and membership of the SPCs (both Councillors and sectoral representatives) shall be for the lifetime of the Council.
- Each SPC will agree an annual work programme which is linked to the strategic policies in the Councils Corporate Plan. The work programmes should be reviewed and updated regularly.
- Each SPC will be required to consider Climate Action and Climate Impacts as part of all policies that form part of its work programme. All work programmes of each SPC and the CPG should ensure that all proposed policies put forward from the SPCs are climate and biodiversity proofed and all SPCs should consider climate action as a cross cutting issue in their work programme.

The proposed structure is set out in Appendix I

PARTICIPANTS

SPC Councillor Membership will reflect the proportionality and distribution of elected representation on the full Council.

External representation on the SPCs will reflect the following:

- The need to represent a spread of relevant interests.
- The need for balance between divergent interests.
- The range of groups within each sector.
- A commitment to foster economic development and social inclusiveness.
- Gender balance.

Groups / Associations / Organisations represented on the SPC structure should be active in the local authority area, be broadly representative and accountable and should have a broad sectoral remit.

It is proposed that the following sectors will be represented on the Council's SPC structure:

Agriculture / Farming (Rural Authorities)

- Development / Construction
- Business / Commercial
- Trade Union
- Environment / Conservation
- Community / Voluntary
- Social Inclusion
- Other groups relevant to the business of an SPC

The nomination of representatives from the Agriculture / Farming, Business Commercial, (including Development / Construction), Trade Union and Environment sectors will be facilitated by the National Pillars. The contact points for those sectors are set out in Appendix II.

The Environmental, Community/Voluntary and Social Inclusion Sectors will be determined on the basis of the local nomination process through the Public Participation Network (PPN)

Nominations from the other sectors will be facilitated by Cork County Council.

Groups / Associations / Organisations who wish to register their interest in participating in the SPC process should do so on the attached form (Appendix III).

SPC MEETINGS - PROCEDURES

- Procedures for SPC meetings are set out in Cork County Council's Standing Orders.
- A calendar of meetings shall be agreed at the start of each year.
- In as far as possible all members of the SPC should be involved in setting up the agenda.
- SPCs are generally held four times per year at a time suitable to SPC members.
 `Documentation concerning SPC meetings should be sent five clear days in advance of meetings with minutes of meetings being circulated in a timely manner.
- The quorum for an SPC shall be all the membership of that Committee divided by three, any fraction being disregarded, subject to such quorum being not less than three members.
- SPC meetings generally take place during the day, but the timing of the meeting will be decided by each SPC in conjunction with Corporate Services.
- Training and Development should be provided to all SPC Members. Training requirements to be discussed and agreed between Chairs of SPCs and members.
- Annual programme of works to be agreed by CPG.

Expenses will be paid by the Local Authority to any SPC Member who do not receive expenses from their own organisation in respect of attendance at SPC meetings.

ETHICS FRAMEWORK & LOBBYING

All Member of the SPC committees should be aware of and understand the Ethics Framework for the Local Government Sector as set out under Part 15 of the Local Government Act 2001 (as amended).

In carrying out their functions under this or any other enactment it is the duty of every Member and employee of a local authority and of every member of every committee to maintain proper standards of integrity, conduct and concern for public interest.

The Standards in Public Office Commission has advised that the Regulation of Lobbying legislation is applicable to Strategic Policy Committees

Cognisance should be taken of the legal obligation of Members in respect of lobbying and ethics framework.

APPOINTMENT OF CHAIRS DESIGNATE

Cork County Council at its meeting of the 21st June 2024 and 9th September, 2024 appointed Councillors to be the Chairs Designate to each SPC as follows:

Under this scheme and in line with Standing Orders each Elected Member will become a member of two Strategic Policy Committees. Elected Members were appointed to each SPC on the 23rd September, 2024. (Appendix IV)

PUBLIC CONSULTATION

In July Cork County Council approved the draft SPC scheme for public consultation and the Scheme was advertised on Friday 23rdth August with closing date of Friday 20th September 2024. Submissions and nominations were also invited from the relevant pillars – Agriculture/Farming, Business Commercial (including Development/Construction), Trade Union and from the PPN.

Nominations from "other sectors" if appropriate will also be facilitated by Cork County Council.

Five submissions were received during this period (Appendix V)

Cognisance was given to all points made in all the submissions received and Cork County Council has built in elements of the submissions in the SPC Scheme for adoption by Elected Members.

There are a number of points made that can be examined by the various SPCs.

- 1. Work programme of each SPC and its Minutes will reflect their role and operations. Terms of Reference will be developed for each SPC.
- 2. Establish Irish Gaeltacht Sub-Committee
- 3. Housing & Population Development Strategy for each Gaeltacht Language Planning area.
- 4. Overview of the role of the PPN presentation to be made to each SPC.
- 5. Overview of the role of Health Ireland LG to be sent/presented to Social Inclusion SPC.
- 6. Allow local wellbeing structures/initiatives to input into SPCs where relevant and provide training for SPC members on the importance of wellbeing and methods to integrate it into policy making.

These will be brought to their attention in due course and built into the Annual Work Programme where applicable.
