- Members welcomed the project for Mallow and reminded Management, Carrigaline also has a very active basketball team who require a training ground and asked for this to be prioritised.

Chief Executive, Moira Murrell said it is a substantial project and confirmed Cork County Council has applied under the Sports Capital Grant for funding.

[d] FINANCIAL BUSINESS

6. <u>"Consideration of report on the financial impact of the LPT variation in order to set a local</u> <u>adjustment factor in accordance with the Finance (Local Property Tax) Act (Section 20)</u> <u>2012, as amended".</u> Jeremy Canty presented a report on LPT to members and the following points were raised:

During the discussion members made the following points:

- The rise from 7.5% to 15% is not acceptable.
- Considering the increase in the cost of living it is not fair on the public to increase the rate to 15%
- They asked for an update on the Atlantic Shellfish.
- As average house prices are increasing there will be a natural rise in LPT, and the Council should not increase it further.

Cllr. Joe Carroll proposed a 10% increase in the rate for a one-year period, seconded by Cllr. Patrick Gerard Murphy.

Cllr. Ger Curley proposed that there would be no change to the current 7.5% rate, seconded by Cllr. Daniel Sexton

Chief Executive, Moira Murrell responded by saying her role as Chief Executive is to look after Cork County Councils Finances and ensure service delivery across all of Cork County's towns and villages and is asking for an increase in the LPT rate to 15%.

A vote was taken to increase the rate of LPT from 7.5% to 10% for a one-year period.

"That the members of Full Council would call for a countywide survey of speed in villages that have regional and national roads running through them".

Cllr. Patrick Gerard Murphy proposed, seconded by Cllr. Noel O' Donovan

During this discussion, the members made the following points:

- Members called for a complete review and said there is a need to adopt one road safety plan for the County.
- Members said raised tables are a great solution in the reduction of speed and asked why they are not in place in more of our towns and villages.
- Cork County Council must join with An Garda Siochana to tackle road safety across the County.
- We need to look at the safe route to schools' scheme and consider other funding options available.
- Members highlighted a back log with Section 38's and Part 8's and said low staffing levels in our regional and local offices must be addressed.
- Innishannon town was highlighted as an area of concern due to large volumes of traffic daily and the lack of road safety measures in place.
- Members said while canvassing for the local elections speed was a huge public concern.
- Members highlighted the N72 and said it is crucial to address the road safety concerns on the road.
- The Killeagh road leading onto the national road is dangerous and road safety measures are urgently required.
- Members asked if Caroline Casey, Road Safety Officer could be invited to brief members on road safety.

Divisional Manager, Kevin Morey responded as follows:

- He is aware that a survey of our road network is current underway to identify areas that can be prioritised for funding.
- Cork County Council will continue to collaborate and work with members and suggested this could be done through SPC.

"Following the recent announcement of Transport Infrastructure Ireland to request that Local Authorities across the country should not proceed to award contracts for certain projects. which includes the N71 Ballylickey to Dromkeal Pavement Scheme and the N71 Newmills /Owenahincha Scheme and other road projects around the county, the members of the West Cork Municipal District have requested that the funding for these projects be reinstated".

Cllr. Patrick Gerard Murphy proposed, seconded by Cllr. Deirdre O' Brien

During this discussion, the members made the following points:

- Members expressed frustration with the TII decision and said planned projects are worthwhile and need to proceed.
- Members said there is damage to the public's perception of Cork County Council due to the change.
- Asked if a road lining truck can be purchased and suggested it could be outsourced while not in use.
- Members said safety on our road network should always be a top priority.
- Members said it shouldn't be the case that funding is provided for greenways but not for much needed road improvements.
- Members said Cork County Council is the largest County and is not getting an adequate share of funding.
- Asked for an investigation into the reasons why the roads budget is not being fully exhausted by year end.

Chief Executive, Moira Murrell responded as follows:

- She assured members Cork County Council will continue to engage with TII on the matter.
- There was a value for money study carried out for the purchase of a road liner and the study found that the purchase was not warranted, however, due to the comments made this will now be reviewed.

Members agreed to write to Minister Ryan to request that funding is reinstated immediately.

8. <u>Western Divisional Committee</u>

"Following the recent announcement by the National Ambulance Service to cut back on cover in Cork and Kerry with the new rosters due to commence on Monday 23rd September which will result in a loss in cover in Cork and Kerry, the members highlighted their concerns that this will have a detrimental effect on their rural communities. The members of the Western Divisional Committee are calling on the National Ambulance Service and the Minister for Health to reverse this decision."

At the agreement of the Members, it was agreed that this motion would be deferred to the next meeting of Full Council on 14/10/2024.

- The current situation is unacceptable and said any small step to protect the lives of innocent civilians is welcomed.
- Members said there is a clear and urgent need to enact the bill and said it is imperative Cork County Council support this.

Members agreed to write to An Taoiseach to enact The Occupied Territories Bill.
