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1. Part 1 News & Updates

1.1. Climate Action

1.1.1 Community Climate Action Programme (CCAP)-Supplementary Call for Applications (Call 1, Part B)

Cork County Council received an allocation of €1,241,000.00 from the Department of Environment Climate & Communications (DECC) to administer Call 1 of the Community Climate Action Programme (CCAP), which opened for applications in December 2023. A portfolio of thirty-one (31) projects totalling €1,000,265.28 was approved following this call, with twenty-nine (29) of these projects commencing on 15th August 2024. One (1) further project has entered the contracting phase with Cork County Council, and is expected to commence in December 2024, while one (1) final project is awaiting final planning permissions.

Cork County Council has now received approval from DECC to run a supplementary call for applications (**Call 1, Part B**), with a total budget of €240,734.72 (the surplus from CCC's initial allocation).

Applications will open on the 11th December 2024 for a period of six (6) weeks, with a closing date of the 22nd January 2025, 16:00.

Successful projects will have a reduced timescale of ten (10) months to deliver their project. Call 1 Part B has an increased focus on more innovative projects and the submission of applications from projects in Cork County's Decarbonising Zone (Macroom) is encouraged.

Call 1 Part B is only open to eligible applicants that did not submit an application under the first Call, and will be based on the same application criteria as the first Call: https://www.corkcoco.ie/en/resident/environment/community-climate-action-programme-ccap

1.2. Emergency Services

1.1.2 External Emergency Plan Exercise – Marinochem, Marino Point

Marinochem Limited (formally Dynea Ireland Limited) began operations in 1997 at Marino Point, Cobh, Co. Cork, to manufacture aminoplast resin adhesives for the panel board (MDF and chipboard) and firelighter industries. The site is considered an Upper-Tier establishment under the COMAH Regulations which requires External Emergency Plans to be tested every three years.

A test of the Marinochem External Emergency Plan took place in Cobh on Wednesday 30th October 2024. The exercise tested a major accident scenario by simulating an activation of the External Emergency Plan for the site. External Emergency Plans are specific Sub-Plans of the Major Emergency Plan of each Principal Response Agency, including Cork County Council.

The event was well supported by the Interagency Emergency Management Office, Cork County Council, An Garda Siochana, the HSE, the Port of Cork, Iarnród Éireann and Marinochem Staff.

















1.1.3 Severe Weather Response



Following the receipt of advance warnings, the council's Severe Weather Assessment Team (SWAT) convene to assess the likely level of response the situation requires based on the severity of the weather forecast and weather warnings, tidal surge warnings from the OPW, local knowledge of particular catchments and coastal areas, antecedent conditions, flood alerts from the ESB and/or information from any Flood Warning Systems in place. The situation is continuously assessed by Cork County Council throughout the duration of the severe weather alert.

Cork County Council's Crisis Management Team (CMT), chaired by the Chief Executive will be alerted in the event of the activation of the Flood Emergency Response Plan.

Inter-agency coordination is established for severe weather events if deemed necessary. This may require the setting up of an On-Site Coordination Group (or Flood Operations Group). Offsite strategic support will be established by the Local Coordination Group in County Hall, if required.

Since the start of the year to the end of November 2024, the SWAT and CMT groups have convened eighteen and seven times respectively in response to Met Éireann weather warnings that were issued:


Storm Bert

Met Éireann issued status red rainfall and status yellow wind warnings for County Cork on 22nd November 2024. Storm Bert was forecast to bring intense falls of rain over a short period of time overnight with the highest accumulations in West Cork. Storm Bert followed a status orange snow, ice and rainfall event across the county on 20th & 21st November.

During this week of severe weather, Cork County Council's Severe Weather Assessment Team convened on eight occasions while the Crisis Management Team convened on three occasions in response to the activation of the Flood Emergency Plan. An on-site coordination centre was established at the Bantry Area Office and the Regional Steering Group (with Senior members of An Garda Síochána, the HSE & the Local Authorities in Cork & Kerry) also convened.

Following widespread flooding, Cork County Council's incident response phase stood down on 27th November 2024. The recovery phase is currently underway allowing clean-up, assessment of damage and humanitarian assistance work to be carried out.





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1.3. Air Quality


1.3.1 EPA calls for strong application of Solid Fuel Regulations.


In their recently published <u>Air Quality in Ireland Report 2023</u>, the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) has called on Local authorities to facilitate proactive choices on both home heating and travel, through strong application of the Solid Fuel Regulations and supporting alternatives to car travel.

The report again highlights that air pollution can be a major environmental risk to people's health, with approximately 1,600 premature deaths annually in Ireland due to poor air quality.

Ireland's latest monitoring shows we are in compliance with current EU standards, and Air Quality in Ireland is generally moving in a positive direction. However, Ireland has committed under the national Clean Air Strategy to achieving the more stringent World Health Organisation (WHO) guideline values by 2040 which will be a challenge.

The main pollutants of concern are fine particulate matter (PM2.5) from solid fuel combustion and nitrogen dioxide (NO2) from vehicle emissions/traffic.

1.4. Waste

1.5.1 Phasing out of the Levy Exemptions for Construction and Demolition Waste.

The phasing out of the waste recovery and landfill levy exemptions for construction and demolition waste came into effect on 1st September 2024. The changes will reduce construction waste and encourage the construction industry to use by product (Article 27) classification as an alternative. The introduction of the levy will reduce construction industry costs and help Ireland achieve its overall waste performance and EU targets. There are four phases commencing on 1st September 2024 for recovering the Waste Recovery levy. The phased approach gives the construction industry time to engage with the Article 27 self-declaration process and ensuring materials are recycled and reused for longer

1.5. Water Quality Programme.


1.5.1 Water Action Plan 2024: Ireland's third River Basin Management Plan launched.

On the 4th September last the **Water Action Plan 2024** was launched. The plan which is Ireland's 3rd River Basin Management Plan covering the period 2023 – 2027, sets out a roadmap to restore Ireland's waterbodies to 'good' status or better, and protect against further deterioration, through an integrated catchment management approach.

Key actions in the Plan include tighter controls on the use of fertilisers that impact water quality, a greater focus on compliance and enforcement with over 60 new staff at local level, and a target of 4,500 farm inspections nationally per year. In addition, continued investment in wastewater infrastructure will see Uisce Éireann investing a multi-billion Euro budget over the period 2025-2029 to reduce impacts on water quality, a new national River Barriers Mitigation Programme will ramp up efforts to remove river-blocks that impact on species like salmon and lamprey swimming upstream to spawn, and a review of arterial drainage requirements and the underpinning Arterial Drainage Act will be undertaken in the context of land use.

The Plan aims to see an additional 300 waterbodies achieve 'good' status by 2027, with targeted measures to improve over 500 more. A Community Water Development Fund is to be provided for 2025, which will provide financial supports to local projects and initiatives.

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1.6. Community Environmental Awareness Programmes

1.6.1 Relove Paint Reaches 30 Tonne Milestone.

The **Relove Paint** programme launched by the council nearly 5 years ago, looks to divert paint deposited at Civic Amenity Sites from incineration to re-use. Through collaboration with local social enterprises the paint is collected from Civic Amenity Sites, filtered, remixed and recoloured creating a low cost but high quality product.

Relove Paint recently reached the significant milestone recently, of 30 tonnes of paint being diverted from incineration to reuse. To reflect on the success and indeed challenges of the project, a workshop took place on 12th November bringing together the three social enterprises producing Relove Paint; Cycle Sense (Skibbereen), IRD Duhallow and Northside Community Enterprises (NCE) along with Council Environment Directorate staff who have supported the initiative since its inception.

Since then the project first started in 2019 it has grown from two social enterprises, Cycle Sense and Northside Community Enterprises (NCE) collecting, remixing and selling paint to the addition of another, IRD Duhallow in 2022. The number of participating civic amenity sites where paint is collected for reuse has also increased from 3 to 9.

The meeting was an opportunity to reflect on where the project has come from, what is working well and what challenges need to be addressed to ensure the viability and sustainability of the project into the future. It was noted that there are 9 paint reuse social enterprises now operating nationally, with 11 Local Authorities participating, 27 civic amenity sites and 80+ tonnes have been diverted from incineration to reuse in total. Based on these statistics, it is evident that Cork County is a leader in paint reuse.

1.6.2 Greening Festivals in Cork County.

While summer may seem like a distant memory now, the Environmental Awareness Team have recently published a video case study showing variety of sustainability initiatives it supported as partners of the Ballymaloe Food Festival in May last. The purpose of the video is to inspire other festivals to do the same! You can view the video here.

The Council has for many years been assisting festivals and events to improve their sustainability. The <u>Green Festival Toolkit</u>, available on the Council website, provides festival organisers with a range of resources to support them in taking action to reduce the impact of their festivals. This year we were delighted to partner with the team at Ballymaloe to pilot a reusable cup system and waste segregation stations at their inaugural Ballymaloe Festival of Food in May 2024. The event saw over 4,000 single use plastics cups avoided and high levels of segregation of recyclable and compostable materials, using the national My Waste signage. Another initiative at the event was the use of the MyGug Biodigester, which turned food waste from the festival into biogas which powered the hobs at the cooking demonstrations., A great example of the circular economy in action.

1.6.3 "Take a minute before you bin it." Campaign.

A new awareness campaign by MyWaste.ie 'Take a minute, before you bin it!' aims to increase awareness and knowledge to improve waste segregation. Statistics from the EPA reveals that two-thirds of what ends up in our general waste bins could have been recycled or composted with food waste being the most misplaced item, followed closely by soft plastics.

The message from MyWaste is that whether at home, at work or at play we can all play our part. As Ireland transitions to a more circular economy, this national initiative highlights how simple individual actions, can collectively boost Ireland's recycling rate.

1.6.4 Composting for Schools Programme.

Cork County Council is funding 11 schools across the County to take part in the Composting for School Programme which is delivered by Composting Ireland. The aim of the programme is to help schools set up, start or improve composting in their school to reduce waste, save money and combat climate change. The programme is both environmental and educational.

The Composting for Schools programme is open to Primary and Post Primary schools and is delivered in a hybrid model with 1 in person workshop, 4 online workshops and 2 school visits during the 2024/2025 academic year. Each school also receives a €250 voucher to spend on composting equipment and they have access to a variety of fun and interactive activities for school children to learn about composting.


1.7. National Broadband Plan (NBP)

1.7.1 Digital Connectivity Strategy Update

In October DECC released their latest Digital Connectivity Strategy update on Ireland's progress towards the digital targets for 2030 prescribed in <u>EU's Digital Decade policy</u>.

The EU have set targets to be achieved under several pillars. The update report contains the following slide summarising Ireland's progress towards the following specified targets,

- All Irish households and businesses will be covered by a Gigabit network no later than 2028.
- All populated areas covered by 5G by no later than 2030.



The other key elements of the Digital Connectivity Strategy Update report are described below:

- Commercial Rollout
 - Fibre Rollout national
 - **Eir** is in the process of building a FTTP (Fibre To The Premises) network to 1.9 million premises, with over 1.3 million premises passed to date.
 - SIRO recently passed over 625,000 premises with full fibre, and they are on track to reach 700,000 premises by 2026.
 - Virgin Media Ireland is committed to a €200m network upgrade to full fibre, which is continuing to 2025 and will support speeds up to 10Gbps. They have recently reached a milestone of enabling 281,000 premises with full fibre.

Commercial Deployment of 5G - national

- **Eir's** 5G network rollout continues to expand, offering coverage to over 70% of the population and encompassing more than 600 cities, towns and villages.
- Vodafone's 5G network is currently live in selected areas across 26 counties in Ireland.
- Three Ireland's 5G network has 90% population coverage and 5G in every county.
- In Q2 2024, there were 1,708,294 5G mobile subscriptions.

Broadband in Non Intervention Areas where High Speed Broadband is not Available

- In the Digital Connectivity Strategy update DECC continue to advise that any consumer in a Blue area who is experiencing difficulties in obtaining high speed broadband should contact their broadband service provider to investigate the issue and to determine the reason why high speed broadband speeds are not available and why such a service cannot be provided. Where a satisfactory response is not received the Department will also address any queries received. It should be noted that high speed broadband continues to be defined as broadband speeds greater than 30Mbps download and 6Mbps upload.
- It is the Government's intention that all premises will have access to high speed broadband and inclusion of premises in the National Broadband Contract remains a fall-back position for high speed broadband provision where no alternative provider can be identified.
- National Broadband Ireland Progress National (see 1.6.2 for Cork County Council progress)
 - Non-commercial areas
 - The State-led subsidised intervention is being delivered by NBI following the Contract award in 2019. NBI are contracted to roll out a high-speed and future-proofed broadband network across all non-commercial areas in every county and this will cover circa 1.1 million people living and working in over 560,000 premises. This includes almost 100,000 businesses and farms along with some 283 Broadband Connection Points and 672 schools.
 - The process of delivering fibre to all homes in the Intervention Area is progressing with momentum. While NBI was committed to delivering a cumulative target of 185,000 premises by the end of 2023 under the revised Contract targets, NBI passed over 205,600 premises up to the end of December 2023.
 - NBI are now making up for delays encountered due to Covid restrictions and they will continue to seek to accelerate the

rollout where possible. The end of 2024 target has been met with over 300,000 passed which is over half of the premises in the Intervention Area.

- To date over 104,517 full fibre connections have been made by NBI across all counties and demand remains very strong where fibre is available.
- National Broadband Contract Key Achievements:
 - 328,622 premises can now order or pre-order a broadband connection.
 - 310,676 premises have now been passed, with over 10,400 premises being passed this month across all counties.
 - NBI are connecting on average 4,200 homes each month.
 - All primary schools (SCPs) and Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) have been installed with high-speed broadband

1.7.2 National Broadband Ireland (NBI) - Cork County Progress

NBI rely on their parent website at https://nbi.ie/ to provide information on the National Broadband Contract. Websites https://nbi.ie/nbp-project-progress/ provides greater detail on the roll-out progress to premises across the Intervention Areas.

NBI continue to operate a dedicated e-mail service at <u>reps@nbi.ie</u> for Elected Representative queries and news items are published at <u>https://nbi.ie/news/updates/</u>. NBI advise of issuing news items direct to relevant Elected Representatives.

Network build is substantially complete in Bere Island, Carrigaline, Fermoy, Hare Island, Kanturk, Long Island, Midleton, Rathmore, Tallow, Templemartin and Youghal DA's.

Deployment in the Abbeyfeale, Clonakilty, Eyeries, Killavullen, Kinsale, Meelin, Mitchelstown, Schull and Skibbereen DA's is ongoing.


Survey works are complete in the Ballingeary, Bantry, Cape Clear/Sherkin Island, Charleville, Dunmanway, Grenagh, Horse Island and Kilcrohane DA's.


Survey works are pending at the Carriganimmy DA.

Approx. 77,000 premises across Cork County will ultimately benefit from access to high-speed broadband constructed under the National Broadband. Broadband connections can now be obtained at approx. 33,000 premises in the intervention area and network build at a further 23,000 premises is ongoing.

An overview of the present status and the roll-out across the country is summarised in the 2 graphics below. Whilst the greatest number of fibre deployments to premises have been achieved across county Cork, there remains the greatest number of premises in Cork where deployment is awaited.

1.7.3 Broadband Connection Points (BCPs)

A National Hub Strategy is presently being drafted by Dept. of Rural and Community Development. Broadband Connection Points are being considered as significant pillars in the strategy document as they are considered to have significant value at the level of communities where users might not yet feel ready to engage with the commercial remote working hubs or with the enterprise hub sectors.

In keeping with the importance attaching to BCP in the National Hub Strategy, DRCD advertised tenders for upgrade of hardware equipment at BCP's. A preferred Tenderer is identified and a contract decision notice has been issued to remaining Tenderers. The 14 day "standstill period" associated with the Tender is now ending. A reconfiguration of backhaul routing will then follow at BCP's. It is anticipated that such upgrade works will facilitate enhanced functionality at BCP's while maintaining digital security around the operation of the BCPP's.

DRCD advise of an intention to maintain the BCP infrastructure for a period of approximately 3 years as they see them as important launch pads for various Arts and Science thematic programmes.

The Council continues to support the Broadband Connection Points (BCPs) initiative and is co-funding the monthly broadband retail service costs at BCP's in association with Dept. Rural and Community Development (DRCD. Many of the BCP's availed of Town and Village funding support to purchase furniture and fittings to enhance remote working opportunities.


Centres across the county hosting BCP sites benefited to amounts of €320K following successful applications under the Community Centre Investment Fund grant scheme aimed at upgrading and development of community centre facilities which had become aged and dilapidated over time.

A total of 25 BCP's are now completed across the county and are operational. 23 of these facilities continue to operate as BCP's. Remote working is being accommodated at a number of BCP's.

Owing to the exit of Inch Community Centre from the BCP initiative, the inclusion of a candidate BCP is being considered at the present.

1.7.4 STEM & STEAM Projects at BCPs

In line with the EU Digital Decade targets set for 2030, Dept. of Rural and Community Development (DRCD) are engaging with various bodies to promote STEM & STEAM (Science, Technology, Engineering, Art and Mathematics) activity through the Broadband Connection Point (BCP) networks.

The Whitechurch BCP hosted a Microsoft DREAM Space activity day recently at which children from local National Schools participated.

The BCP at Ionad Áise, Renaniree, Macroom also recently hosted Vex Robotics workshops. The Ionad Áise also participate in The Ark/DRCD thematic art programme (www.ark.ie).

The OurKidsCode programme has gained some traction across the Cork BCP network with programmes conducted at BCP's in Castlelyons, Castletownkenneigh, Ballindangan, Laharn and at Whitechurch. There are plans at present to have follow on OutKidsCode programmes at Ballindangan and at Castlelyons.

There are also plans to commence OutKidsCode programmes at Bere Island Heritage Centre, at Mealagh Valley Community Centre and at Riverstick Community Centre.

OurKidsCode is a research project based in Trinity College Dublin, funded by Science Foundation Ireland, the Department of Education and the Department of Rural and Community Development. The core aims are to increase parental involvement and promote greater diversity computer education, by providing STEM opportunities for families with primary aged children, particularly in rural communities.

1.7.5 More on Commercial Operator Activity

SIRO report of continuing deployment across the county and of having approximately 30,000 premises passed with fibre and of their intention to pass a further 16,000 premises with fibre by end of 2025. The principal areas where SIRO have been working and the numbers passed in each area include Bandon-(1,667), Carrigaline-(6,041), Carrigtowhill-(423), Crosshaven-(403), Fermoy-(799), Little Island-(6,916), Mallow-(5,349), Midleton-(5,045), Skibbereen-(1,873) and Youghal-(1,816),

Imagine Broadband advise that the take up of fibre connections to the NBI network has made it commercially unviable for them to continue providing fixed wireless service in certain regions. As an immediate response, Imagine will be closing fixed wireless broadband network broadcast masts in Lisgould North on the 30/10/2024 and on Bandon Hill on 09/01/2025. Imagine have been key to providing many rural dwellers with high-speed broadband when wireless broadband was the only option for many households. Imagine are providing helpline services to those who will be affected by the shutdown of their broadcast masts and will assist their customers in providing information on the alternatives now available to them.

Vodafone continue to shut down their 3G network across Cork County. Vodafone advise that this shut down of the 3G network has been successfully undertaken in many other parts of the country. For people with older phones (pre smart phone models) they will seamlessly transfer to the 2G network that will continue to be maintained by Vodafone.

The Vodafone shutdown of the 3G network primarily affects Vodafone customers but it should be noted that Clear Mobile and An Post also use the Vodafone network, so this means that 3G services for Clear Mobile and An Post customers will also be retired. The move by Vodafone is part of a worldwide trend to abandon the 3G network which is considered uneconomic to support. Further information can be obtained on ComReg website at <u>3G Retirement | Commission for Communications Regulation</u> (comreg.ie) and ComReg lists some other devices that may be affected.

The shutdown of 3G networks by other providers is expected to continue.

The continuing roll-out of fibre to all premises will cause traffic on the older copper telecoms infrastructure to continue to reduce, ultimately leading to a situation where continuing support of the copper cables will become uneconomic. ComReg is presently engaging with the telecom companies as to protocols for managing the future migration of services from the copper infrastructure to the fibre network.


NAIP Inspections

The EPA allocated specific minimum farm inspection numbers to each local authority under the <u>National Agricultural Inspection Programme (NAIP) 2024 & 2025</u>. The purpose of the NAIP is to help maintain or bring about an improvement in natural water quality in Ireland. Under the plan Cork County Council has been instructed to undertake initial (first time) Good Agricultural Practice (GAP) inspections on a minimum of 452 farms in 2024 and 586 farms in 2025.

It must be noted that this is the minimum number of first-time inspections in 2024 and 2025, the council has an ongoing programme of follow up engagements and currently plans to undertake over 1,000 farms inspections in total in 2024.




